- The First World War took place between 1914 and 1918.
- People who fought in wars, like Walter Tull, are remembered for their bravery.
- People are remembered in different ways, such as on monuments or plaques and by symbols such as poppies. Including during Remembrance Day, on 11th November each year.
- Soldiers in the First World War often fought in trenches.
- Many women took on men's jobs during the First World War.
- I can start to understand that during the same period of time, life was different for people in the past, such as rich and poor, male and female.
- I can explain some reasons why a person or event is significant.



- The Great Fire of London happened in 1666.
- The fire started in a bakery on Pudding Lane
- Buildings were close together and often made of wood, meaning that the fire spread quickly.
- For many years after the fire, buildings were rebuilt further apart and made with stone.
- To be able to say how life was different in the 17th Century compared to today. What is the same and what is different?
- I can use historical sources to develop my understanding and ideas.
- I can use a timeline to order important events.
- I can say why this event was an important part of history and why.
